

God bless you as you have the Bread of Life to feed anyone who may need a morsel in 2023.




Two members, Sister Edith Ragsdale and Sister Jean Hobbs, attended Founder's Day which was truly blessed.








Even though we are still in pandemic times we were able to attend the IAMWMW, Inc. Founder's Day. It was a beautiful celebration.





### **Medicine and You**

Over time, new variants of the coronavirus with lower hospitalization and mortality rates have evolved. However, the World Health Organization (WHO) cautions that the pandemic is in transition and remains a health emergency. The International Federation of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies released warnings that all countries remain unprepared for future outbreaks.

The United States' vaccination program is designed to prevent severe disease, hospitalization, and death. Vaccinations are most effective against the original coronavirus. The coronavirus booster is effective against the Omicron variant and BA.4/BA.5 sub-variants. Booster shots offer much less protection against the newest variants of the coronavirus, XBB and a sub-lineage, XBB.1.5. However, even a small boost in protection is beneficial to the most vulnerable populations, people older than 65 years of age, and people who are immunocompromised.

Currently, XBB and XBB.1.5 viruses are causing a spike in COVID-19. Some who become infected will need hospitalization or out-patient medical care. Treatment for COVID-19 is expensive. People without insurance may find medical care unaffordable. People with health insurance can reach their out-of-pocket max with just one drug infusion. Health insurance does not cover most vitamins, supplements, alternative therapies and experimental treatments.

The Center for Disease Control and Prevention currently recommends getting vaccinated, avoiding crowded indoor spaces, and frequent hand washing. Immunocompromised individuals and senior citizens should consider wearing masks. Following the American Heart Association recommendation of limiting added sugar to a maximum of six teaspoons per day for women and nine teaspoons per day for men can reduce blood sugar level. Beyond healthcare cost, COVID-19 results in lost earnings, disability, and reduced quality of life, especially for those who develop long term COVID-19. It is best to avoid becoming infected.

# Seasoned with Love

### Cilantro Chicken Salad

- 3 large boneless chicken breast halves
- 1 Tablespoon vegetable oil
- 1 Tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- 3 large celery stalks, sliced
- 2 green onions, chopped
- 3 Tablespoons chopped fresh cilantro
- 2 Tablespoons finely chopped red bell pepper
- 1/4 cup mayonnaise





### A SCRIPTURE A DAY KEEPS THE DEVIL AWAY

Psalm 119:1-176

Psalm 119 is written as an acrostic poem, the author is unknown but some have suggested it may have been Ezra the priest, written at the time that the temple had been rebuilt, almost every verse of Psalm 119 mentions God's Word in some way, just as Psalm 119 is the longest chapter of the Bible, two Psalms just before, Psalm 117, is the shortest chapter of all, and the overall message of Psalm 119 focuses on the truth of God's Word.

Psalm 119:1-8 (Aleph) - I long to keep the Lord's law!

Psalm 119:9-16 (Beth) - I long to meditate on the Lord's law!

**Psalm 119:17-24 (Gimel) –** I delight in the depths of the Lord's law!

Psalm 119:25-32 (Daleth) - I long to understand the word of the Lord!

Psalm 119:33-40 (He) – My only delight is in the Lord's law!

Psalm 119:41-48 (Waw) – I trust in the Lord's law, which is my only salvation.

Psalm 119:49-56 (Zayin) - I find hope and comfort in the Lord's law.

Psalm 119:57-64 (Heth) - The Lord's law is my only source of hope in times of trouble.

Psalm 119:65-72 (Teth) – Affliction has come upon me.

Psalm 119:73-80 (Yodh) - Let my affliction turn others to God.

Psalm 119:81-88 (Kaph) - How long must I be afflicted?

Psalm 119:89-96 (Lamedh) - The Lord's law has helped me endure my affliction.

Psalm 119:97-104 (Mem) - The Lord's law gives me understanding and wisdom.

"...And keep the charge of the LORD, that ye die not; for so I am commanded" (Lev. 8.35)

INTRODUCTION: A song which encourages us to keep the charge that has been given to us is "A Charge To Keep I Have" (#201 in Hymns for Worship Revised, and #215 in Sacred Selections for the Church). The text was written by Charles Wesley, who was born at Epworth in Lincolnshire, England, on Dec. 18, 1707, the eighteenth child and youngest son of Samuel and Susanna Wesley, and the brother of John Wesley whose work resulted in the formation of the Methodist Church. The brother's father was an Anglican minister, and Charles was educated at home by his parents, at Westminster School beginning in 1716, and at Christ Church College, Oxford, in 1726. While at Oxford, he formed a "Holy Club" with his bother and their friend George Whitefield. This group of young students were called "Methodists" due to the strictly formal method of study which they practiced. Becoming a minister in the Church of England in 1735, like his father and brother, he accompanied his brother the following year on a trip to the English colony of Georgia, where he served as private secretary to Governor James E. Oglethorpe.

Because of some trouble in Georgia, after a few months Charles returned to England where he became associated with a group of Moravians on Aldersgate St. in London and in 1738 experienced his "spiritual conversion." This released within him his gift of song. The very next day he penned his first hymn, "Where shall my wandering soul begin," and before his death completed some 6,500 hymns on every conceivable subject of scripture, including such well-known favorites as "Jesus, Lover of My Soul," "Soldiers of Christ, Arise," and "Love Divine." These appeared in 56 different collections published by the Wesleys over 53 years. Shortly after his conversion, he began working with the felons in Newgate Prison and preaching at Islington, both in London, but was soon forbidden to preach in the established churches because of his new ideas. From this time on, he was closely associated with his brother in their travelling evangelistic work. After his marriage to Sarah Gwynne in 1749, his work was largely confined to Bristol and London.

"A Charge To Keep" first appeared in the Wesley's Short Hymns on Select Passages of Scripture, Vol. 1, of 1762. It was said to have been inspired by a reading of Matthew Henry's commentary on the book of Leviticus. Charles disagreed with his brother's inclination to separate from the Church of England and so resisted those of the "Methodist" Group who wanted to form a distinct communion, remaining a loyal member of the Anglican Church all of his life. While remembered primarily as a songwriter, Charles was also a powerful preacher, and delivered his last sermon at the age of 80 in March of 1788 at London's City Road Chapel. His death occurred shortly afterward at Marylebone in London, England, on Mar. 29, 1788. The tune (Boyleston) that is found with this song in most of our books was composed by Lowell Mason (1792-1872). It first appeared in his work The Choir, or Union Collection of Church Music in 1832, where it was used with "Our days are as the grass." It is possibly based on a Gregorian melody.

CONCLUSION: This is a relatively short song, but it is particularly beneficial because it impresses us with the fact that true Christianity is more than just "going to church" on Sunday, or even profiting from the worship, as important as that may be. It is a total commitment demonstrated in complete obedience to God's will. This song has been in nearly every hymnbook published by members of the Lord's church for use among churches of Christ. I grew up singing it. We would frequently use it at the beginning of the worship service to remind us of the seriousness of our purpose in worship to prepare ourselves for service to the Lord. However, in my past quarter-century plus of preaching experience it has been sung much less frequently than I remember when growing up, perhaps because too many people want Christianity without real commitment. However, I must learn to do my Master's will in all things and be careful not to betray that trust because "A Charge To Keep I Have."
